

### EC program launches in Williamson to test startup ideas

Before Dart Music became a rising star in Nashville's music tech industry, it started as an idea formed by founder and CEO Chris McMurtry. Dart Music seeks to solve the digital distribution problem for classical music by allowing classical music composers and niche classical record labels to upload their music to digital streaming services. McMurtry turned to the Nashville Entrepreneur Center (EC) to birth his idea into reality through their PreFlight program. PreFlight is the EC's premiere pre-accelerator educational program for entrepreneurs with idea stage startups looking to create a foundation for

launching their businesses. McMurtry has since graduated from the first class of Project Music, the Entrepreneur Center's music industry incubator.



The EC is hoping to find their next big idea in Williamson County through a partnership with Williamson, Inc. to bring PreFlight to aspiring entrepreneurs who live and work in the county.

"We're excited about being able to access groups of entrepreneurs and business people that might not otherwise have been able to make it to the EC," said John Murdock, the EC's vice president of entrepreneurial development and facilitator of the PreFlight classes.

"We had a lot of entrepreneurs approaching us after we opened that said they weren't ready for an accelerator," said Murdock. "Perhaps they weren't committed to the idea full-time yet, maybe they weren't sure the business was going to be in the type of model that would fit the accelerator program, or maybe they didn't know how to talk about it in a way that would convince investors."

Murdock, who joined the EC team in July 2011, says it is also for people who

### PreFlight launches for aspiring entrepreneurs (CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1)

may have an established startup that's generating revenue but may want a system and support network to help get through early phases and get traction in the marketplace. However, Murdock says a business license or other legal status is not needed in order to take the class. In fact, Murdock encourages participants to take the class before filing any legal documents to explore whether the company's business model is the right fit in terms of time, money and feasibility.

"It's a really cheap way, relative to investing a lot of your time and money pursuing an idea, to understand if it's worth the time," Murdock said.

The EC, a nonprofit focused on connecting entrepreneurs with the critical

resources they need to successfully create, launch and grow their businesses, launched PreFlight two years ago out of a growing need for assistance from entrepreneurs wanting to test their ideas without the associated commitment or risk. Now, the EC is branching out in new ways to expand the program to other Tennessee counties and nonprofits across the country.

"We've used the program outside of Nashville already in different models," Murdock said. "What we are doing with Williamson, Inc. will be our most intensive format of providing the program where we go out and teach the program onsite to participants, rather than have them streaming the class virtually."

PreFlight will take 30 participants on a 14-week journey consisting of 90-minute interactive classes on Wednesday nights from 5:30 to 7 p.m.

Classes begin Feb. 3 and conclude April 27 at the Chamber office, 5005 Meridian Blvd., Suite 150 in Franklin. The registration fee of \$1,250 includes two seats per startup. Registration will remain open until all slots are filled.

Murdock uses real examples and issues to explore key concepts covered in the class. Participants receive a variety of benefits, including: the opportunity to apply skills in ideation, customer development, product-market fit, pricing and pitch-building; unlimited access to the EC's mentor pool of more than 200 business leaders, startup operators, resources providers and industry specialists (based on availability); an invitation to attend EC community events like Sip It!, Entrepreneur's Happy Hour and special speakers; drop-in first-come, first-serve workspace at the EC during business hours; and an opportunity to pitch to a panel of startup and investment experts for feedback at the program's end.

Participants will also have access to more than six hours of in-depth presentations through an online platform.

Murdock has worked with more than 1,000 entrepreneurs, and graduates have raised \$70 million from investors. Similar to McMurtry's Dart Music, PreFlight graduates may go on to other accelerator programs or may choose to fly solo and launch their business with the tools gained in class.





### FSSD awarded top honors at state school board convention

The Franklin Special School District (FSSD) Board of Education, collectively and individually, received the highest awards given at the Tennessee School Boards Association's (TSBA) annual state conference on Nov. 16. During an awards luncheon in Nashville, the TSBA announced the FSSD Board of Education as the 2015 Tennessee School Board of the Year. Tim Stillings, FSSD's board chairman, received the most prestigious honor awarded to a school board member by the TSBA, the School Board Member of the Year and Hal C. Henard Distinguished Service Award, Allena Bell, serving her first elected term, was selected as a Master Ambassador for her outreach efforts to increase community awareness and understanding of public education issues.

Stillings, who was first elected in 1998, is serving his fifth term on the board as chairman. He is approaching 20 years of board service, with previous appointments as board treasurer, secretary and vice chairman. Bell was appointed in 2013 to fill a vacant seat and was subsequently elected in 2014 to serve a four-year term.

FSSD is a K-8 school system with approximately 3,850 students enrolled and eight schools. On the 2015 State Report Card, FSSD received all A's in achievement in the three testing categories — reading/ language arts, math and science — and maintained a high level of academic growth based on the TCAP scores administered last spring to third through eighth-grade students.

FSSD is one of 14 special school districts in Tennessee, which is enabled by legislative action and operates independently from county districts. FSSD's six-member body serves four-year staggered terms with an election of new members every two vears. The other four members are: Alicia Spencer Barker, Robert Blair, Robin

Newman and Kevin Townsel.

"The Point" sat down with Bell and Stillings to discuss their accolades and what exactly makes FSSD "special."

### Congratulations on being awarded School Board of the Year. Tell us about how this came about?

STILLINGS: Allena has done a remarkable job of making sure we met all the qualifying requirements and documented our milestones. To be considered for the award, school boards must be a TSBA Board of Distinction. The FSSD Board is currently in its second of two years as a TSBA Board of Distinction. The last time the FSSD won School Board of the Year was in 1998.

BELL: We were already doing the right things. It was just a matter of documenting our excellence.

### What accomplishments of the Board are you most proud of?

BELL: Our board has unquestioned integrity. It's a pleasure to share with students and teachers how much of an honor it is to serve them and how all of our decisions center around what's best for them.

STILLINGS: For me, it would be fiscal stewardship. We invest more per student than any other district in the state, and our results show that this is a good investment.

### What makes you a wellfunctioning board?

STILLINGS: This is a nonpartisan board that is laserfocused on excellence in teaching and learning for all. We are not compensated

and serve at-large. I'm okay with this because it allows us to eliminate some superfluous things. We do our business and we turn over what is not our business to staff and administration. We don't serve at the special interest of one neighborhood or district. Every school reflects the

community as a whole. • What puts the "special" in Franklin Special School District, and what distinguishes you from Williamson

County Schools?

BELL: We have a lot of things in common with WCS as far as being a high-achieving school district and having a big focus on school readiness. We have a laser-like focus to make sure a wide range of learners are able to grow in their educational experiences. We offer music, art, physical education/recess and computer science programs in our elementary schools five days a week. We believe this is extremely important in the full development of the child. Another distinction is that FSSD received the First Lady

Michelle Obama's HealthierUS School Challenge: Smarter Lunchrooms Award at the Gold level.

> STILLINGS: Our population of students is different from WCS.

> > Our free and reduced lunch rate is about 40 percent, whereas at the county-wide level the rate is very low. This means we have to provide, without as many resources, programs that will help our special populations achieve at the

same or better level than what we're measured against in the county. We approach teaching and learning from a holistic perspective.

### Are there any programs or initiatives that involve the Williamson County business community?

BELL: We are proud members of the Williamson Chamber and our Director of Schools, Dr. David Snowden, gives a joint Chamber address with Williamson County Schools Director, Dr. Mike Looney. Secondly, the Raise Your Hand Williamson initiative in partnership with the United Way of Williamson County lets employees volunteer as afternoon tutors, mentors and readers in the classroom. We partner with the health department for the Walk Across Williamson challenge, a walking contest between WCS and FSSD families that awards \$3,000 toward the winning school's physical education department. Leadership Franklin plays a huge role in engaging our students about leadership skills. The annual Career Exploration Day, hosted with WCS in November, helps broaden students' perspectives about future careers. The Williamson County Education Foundation allows businesses to earmark donations toward specific schools. And First Tennessee Bank and Cornerstone Financial Credit Union provides monetary gifts to the district's top teaching award recipients.

### In what ways can the business community get involved in FSSD?

STILLINGS: We're always looking for more ways to partner with businesses. As the community grows with large corporations relocating to the county, we would be interested in high-level partnerships on special programs. For instance, specialized language academies or a STEM lab co-sponsored by a corporation would be great to have in our schools. We want businesses, large and small, to feel invested because their employees have children in our schools.

### Student Pitch Day competition showcases innovative startup ideas

Entrepreneurship and economics permeated Centennial High School in a creative way on Wednesday, Dec. 2 for Entrepreneur Day. Approximately 90 honors students from Don Kirby's 12th grade economics class gathered in the school library, joined by a team of judges consisting of local business owners, parents and economic development staff, for a half-day pitch contest.

"These kids are honors economics students," said Kirby, a 30-year veteran teacher of Williamson County Schools. "They take one semester of economics, and this is one of those honors economics projects that they are required to do for credit. They've been working on these presentations all semester."

As part of their economics class, students were divided into groups of two or three and given an assignment to come up with a product, formulate a business plan, and develop a "pitch" for investors

and consumers to buy into their product. In a series of eight-minute pitching rounds, judges listened to each team present their reasons for investing in their mock company.

Topics covered in each student's presentation included market strategy, target audience, profit, price, sales margins and industry growth projections for their business. After four rounds of pitching, the top three teams — calculated from cumulative judges' scores — participated in a final presentation in front of all the judges and their fellow students.

Despite being a hypothetical simulation of what entrepreneurs actually encounter when launching a startup, the ideas and products were innovative and ingenious. The products ranged from the "Hop n' Rock," a jump rope that syncs with your Bluetooth music player for fun exercise, to the "Origami Company," a machine designed for restaurants that eliminates the manual labor aspect of

folding up silverware into napkins, with the machine doing all the folding. The winning group, who all won passes to SOAR Adventure Tower in Franklin, was "Dreams Do Come True Princess Parties." The business aimed to provide entertainment for children's parties in the form of popular animated characters.

The judges, representing businesses including Jet's Pizza, TransAmerica and Premise Health, shared their best advice for students, not only looking to become an entrepreneur but entering into the business world at large. Advice included honing presentation skills, gaining experience at a business, failing fast and knowing your product. Kerry Schrader, president and co-founder of the startup MixTroz, added that starting a business is hard and rewarding and "nothing worth having is easy."

### Job Shadow Day recruits local businesses to shed light on careers



During last year's Job Shadow Day, Summit High School graduate Josh Sadler worked as an engineering intern at Atmos Energy to enhance his studies in the Project Lead The Way Engineering Program.

Williamson businesses are invited to be a part of shaping the next generation of job seekers by participating in one of Williamson County Schools' (WCS) most unique learning experiences. Job Shadow Day, set for April 19, wants to recruit more than 100 companies to offer job shadow experiences in all vocational areas.

"The day is an effective, low-cost way for companies — large and small — to preview and promote their career and internship opportunities as well as influence a student's career-making decision," said WCS Career Counselor Rebecca Collins.

This work-based learning program, which is coordinated by the district's Career and Technical

Education department, gives students the opportunity to spend time on the job with an employer while getting a real-world, hands-on experience in their field of interest.

Employers can organize a job shadow experience that best fits their company. They will determine the agenda for the day, the number of students they can host, and the career opportunity highlighted. For example, the employer can decide to host one student or 20 students for two hours or a full eight hours.

WCS staff will market opportunities to students based on information employers provide in advance and will register students for specific company visits. Students will be responsible for their own transportation to the job shadow site.

Job Shadow Day is one of several ways that Williamson, Inc. partners with Williamson County Schools as part of the Chamber's six-point strategic plan to building a prosperous, growing county. Education is a key driving force in our local economy; therefore, Williamson, Inc. fosters ways in which the business community can strengthen their relations with the public schools and next generation leaders.


## Distillery owner to speak on avoiding first-year startup pitfalls at First Friday
